

The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test measures whether students are meeting the minimum standard for literacy across all subjects up to the end of Grade 9. You need to successfully complete the Literacy Test to earn your Ontario Secondary School Diploma and graduate.


The OSSLT will be written on Tuesday, April 8 (last names A-L) and Wednesday, April 9 (last names M-Z). Writers should go to room 241 (at the back of the library) *instead* of their period 1 class.

There are two sessions to complete that will take approximately an hour each. Those will IEPs will be accommodated accordingly, and may be writing the test on a different day.

To help you further prepare for the literacy test we have some tips and resources below!

OSSLT BREAKDOWN

- **Real-life Narrative:** a reading passage and multiple-choice questions.
- Information Paragraph: a reading passage and multiple-choice questions.
- **News Report:** a news report reading, one written response and multiple-choice questions.
- **Dialogue:** a narrative scene (story) and multiple-choice questions.
- Written Multiple-Choice: multiple-choice writing questions about grammar rules.
- Series of Paragraphs Expressing an Opinion: one written response composed of a series of paragraphs.



TIPS TO REMEMBER

- Read all reading selections carefully. Use the split screen tool to see the text and question at the same time.
- Use the annotation tools, like the highlighter tool (or underline) to help you find evidence in the texts.
- Read all questions carefully and highlight or underline keywords.
- Go back and reread important parts of the text to answer the questions. Use the highlighter tool to help you.
- Make sure you answer all parts of the questions.
- Brainstorm and organize your thoughts before you start writing. Use the rough notes tool provided, or paper and pencil.
- Pay attention to the word count tracker. The short writing piece is 100 words and the long writing piece is 500 words.
- Proofread your work carefully.
